



# FAMILY VIOLENCE RESTRAINING ORDERS: SHUTTLE CONFERENCES

If you and your ex-partner have a Family Violence Restraining Order (FVRO) case some Magistrates Courts have the option of going to an FVRO shuttle conference.

In this fact sheet the term ex-partner is used because this is the most common situation, but an FVRO can also be made between you and another family member, such as a parent, sibling or cousin.

## What is an FVRO Shuttle Conference?

An FVRO shuttle conference is a type of mediation which takes place at court with you and your ex-partner sitting in separate rooms in different parts of the court building. You and your ex-partner would not see each other during the conference. The conference is run by a Registrar who goes back and forth or “shuttles” between your room and the room of your ex-partner to help you try and reach an agreement.

## Do you have to go to an FVRO shuttle conference?

You and your ex-partner will only have an FVRO shuttle conference if you both agree to take part. If you are the applicant (the person who applied to court for an FVRO) you can say whether or not you want to attend a conference when you fill in your paperwork applying for an FVRO.

If you are the respondent (the person objecting to the FVRO) you can say whether or not you want to attend a conference when you fill in your paperwork objecting to the FVRO.

## What does the Registrar do?

FVRO shuttle conferences are run by a Registrar who works for the court. Registrars are independent. This means they are not on your side or your ex-partner’s side. Registrars are experienced in helping people try to reach an agreement. Registrars are also experienced in family violence cases and will not pressure you to agree to anything during the shuttle conference.

## Who can attend the FVRO conference with me?

A lawyer can attend the FVRO conference with you to give you legal advice and represent you. A support person can also attend the conference with you.

## What are the benefits of attending an FVRO shuttle conference?

The benefits of attending an FVRO shuttle conference include:

- a Registrar can help you reach an agreement that suits your situation and get the best outcome in your case,
- the waiting time to have a shuttle conference is a lot shorter than waiting for a final order hearing (also often called a trial),
- the focus of the conference is to reach an agreement with your ex-partner rather than at a trial where you are on opposite sides each trying to win the court case,
- if an agreement is reached at the conference, you will not need to go to trial avoiding a lot of stress, cost and time.

## What safety measures are in place at an FVRO shuttle conference?

You and your ex-partner will be in separate rooms for the conference and there will be a security officer at each conference location in the court.

The court will also arrange for you both to arrive at different times, so you don't come into contact with each other.

If you are worried about your safety at the conference you can contact the court before your conference date to arrange extra safety measures.

## Where can you get help?

Free legal advice and representation at FVRO shuttle conferences is available for both applicants and respondents.

FVRO shuttle conferences may be available for FVRO proceedings lodged at Perth, Joondalup, Fremantle, Armadale and Bunbury Magistrates Courts.
